VENUE OF THE MEETING:

ACCOMMODATION:

Participants are expected to stay at the <u>Accra Beach Hotel and Spa in Barbados</u>. Please find the hotel information: Address: Barbados BB15139, West Indies. Phone: +1 (246) 435-8920.

UNDP has negotiated a special discount for the accommodation and related facilities. In this regard, and to maximize the results from the event, all participants are expected to stay in the selected Hotel.

UNDP Regional Hub will cover directly with the Hotel the accommodation expenses and will book the rooms directly with the hotel.

The driving distance between the Accra Beach Hotel and the Hilton Resort Hotel is approximately 10 min.

HOW TO ARRIVE TO THE HOTEL:

The UNDP Regional Hub will cover Flight tickets.

Most international airlines fly to Barbados through the Grantley Adams International Airport (BGI).

<u>Airport – Hotel - Airport</u>: The hotel is located 20 – 30 minutes from Grantley Adams International Airport. It offers easy access to the city and the beach.

Approximate one-way taxi fare between the Grantley Adams International Airport and the Accra Beach Hotel and Spa Barbados is USD\$35. There is also a taxi app known as <u>PickUp Barbados</u> (similar to Uber).

PRACTICAL INFORMATION:

Language	The official language is English.
Weather	Barbados' climate is warm and humid throughout the year. The average temperature is between 21° to 31° C. From June to December is a wet season, with sudden rain and thunderstorms expected.
Time zone	GMT- 4
Country code	Country code is +1 246. Telephone communications with the rest of the world are good.
Currency	The Barbados Dollar (BBD) is the national currency, (2 BBD = 1 USD\$). Credit cards are accepted.
Tipping in restaurants	10% to 15% of the bill is the suggested amount.









Voltage	115 Volts, 50 Hertz. US Plug (A y B).
Clothing	Using light clothing outdoors is recommended. For meetings and workshops, where the air conditioning is usually strong, it is good to bring a light jacket or shawl.
Security	Currently Barbados is at SECURITY LEVEL 1; however, Security Clearance is required to travel to Barbados.
Health and Vaccines	Sanitary conditions in Barbados are good. Medical and hospitals services are good but quite expensive. The same applies to the medicines. Yellow Fever vaccine is required. You should travel with a vaccination card.
Driving License	You need a Barbados driving license to drive in Barbados. You can buy one from a car hire company or online from the <u>Barbados Revenue Authority</u> .

SECURITY CLEARANCE AND VISA:

Travel Advisory: Barbados is currently in "Security Level 1". However, please always bear in mind the following recommendations:

- Do not wear jewelry when you are planning to go outside the hotel, especially when you are going to crowded, dark and/or lonely places.
- Leave your passport, air ticket and other valuables in your hotel room, in the safe- deposit box. Carry only the necessary cash, credit card and ID card.
- Please always take care of your carry-on luggage, especially your personal laptop.
- Use only secure transport applications.

Visa Requirements: Each participant is responsible for making sure they have their visa arrangements in order to travel to Barbados. For those travelling with national passport, please refer to the local consulate regarding travel requirements to Barbados.

Introduction

The Knowledge Fair "Empowering Voices, Ending Gender-Based Violence", led by UNDP in the framework of the Spotlight Initiative Caribbean Regional Programme, is an innovative gathering that aims to tackle Gender-Based Violence (GBV) in the Caribbean. Set in Bridgetown, Barbados, from November 6th to 8th, 2023, this knowledge fair brings together a diverse community of stakeholders committed to addressing GBV and Family Violence (FV). The fair, organized under the auspices of the Spotlight Initiative Caribbean Regional Programme, seeks to foster cooperation, partnerships, and knowledge exchange among governments, civil society, academia, and grassroots communities. Through dynamic discussions, artistic expressions, and interactive sessions, the knowledge fair provides a platform for showcasing successful initiatives, celebrating actors, and promoting cultural and behavioral change. The fair will pave the way for transformative and sustainable progress towards a Caribbean free from GBV and FV.

The knowledge fair seeks to celebrate the efforts of diverse actors who have contributed to addressing GBV and FV in the Caribbean. The fair's themes and criteria, collaboratively developed with Recipient UN Organizations (RUNOs) prioritize innovation, coordination, intersectionality, cultural relevance, sustainability, and replicability. A "Coalition of the Willing," comprising UN Regional Agencies, UN Country Offices, the Spotlight Regional Programme, the Civil Society Regional Reference Group and regional allies -RUNOs, Civil Society Reference Groups, Regional institutions and CSOs working on GBV, Implementing Partners, Academia working on Gender Studies, among others-, will curate the program, ensuring a diverse and impactful selection of proposals. The knowledge fair will provide a transformative space for sharing knowledge, fostering networks, and amplifying collective efforts to addressing GBV and FV and empower Caribbean voices for lasting change.

Specific Objectives

NAME: The Fair seeks to recognize the actors who have contributed to addressing GBV and FV, particularly those who have been part of the Spotlight Programme and other impactful initiatives.

Through inspirational presentations, success stories, and interactive sessions, the fair will highlight the efforts and dedication of individuals and organizations, inspiring others to join the cause.

CONNECT: The Fair aims to promote the creation and consolidation of networks and communities of practice dedicated to addressing GBV and FV. These networks will act as a catalyst for continued progress and strengthen the collective impact of efforts in addressing GBV and FV.

NOURISH: The Fair focuses on disseminating knowledge, cultural products, services, and practices that address GBV and FV. The knowledge fair will feature a range of workshops, seminars, and exhibitions that showcase innovative approaches, evidence-based interventions, and artistic expressions aimed at promoting gender equality and GBV prevention. Through the dissemination of valuable resources, the fair aims to nourish the collective knowledge base and inspire new initiatives.

AMPLIFY: The Fair focuses on promoting knowledge exchange and partnerships to adapt, replicate, or scale up impactful work. By actively promoting cross-learning, the fair seeks to amplify the impact of effective interventions, enabling participants to adapt successful approaches to their specific contexts.
